Women's Club.



PWC Supports Purdue Scholarships...how we are making a difference!

Purdue Women's Club supports the Purdue Adult Student Support Program, better known as SPAN Plan. This is PWC's primary philanthropy, fostering the belief that learning should be a lifelong endeavor. The SPAN Plan offers adult students two different scholarship opportunities: the Parent Support Scholarship which helps cover childcare for students with children, and a general scholarship fund which helps with academic needs. Eligible recipients receive scholarships in varying amounts, up to a maximum of \$2500 per year, providing they remain academically eligible.

Members have an opportunity to support the program through membership renewals, the spring and fall luncheons, and by direct donation. Checks can be mailed to the PWC mailing address at any time throughout the year. Some members even choose to do automatic monthly donations. You have the option of directing your donation to the SPAN Plan Academic Scholarship or the Parent Support Fund by writing a check made out to "Purdue Foundation for Life" with "PWC-SPAN Plan Parent Support Fund or PWC Academic Scholarship" on the memo line and mailing it to:


In 2021 to 2022, the club donated \$2500. Individual donations added an additional \$5,440.

Newcomers have been important to PWC since the beginning, In May of 1928, the Board established a "Newcomers Division". Corby Springer and her team are doing a wonderful job carrying out this tradition.

The Newcomers enjoyed a great trip to Delphi on June 16th for an Erie Canal Boat Ride Tour. Our group took a 40 min. tour. Our guide shared history about the 1850's canal. Some of the Newcomers toured the Interpretive Museum while others toured the Pioneer Village. Some people enjoyed a sack lunch in the breezy shade at Speece Shelter and others headed to an air-conditioned spot!

The Wabash and Erie Canal was a shipping canal in the 1850's that linked the Great Lakes to the Ohio River via an artificial waterway. The canal provided traders with access from the Great Lakes all the way to the Gulf of Mexico. Over 460 miles long, it was the longest canal ever built in North America.





Sutter Lily Farm







Newest Club Wide Activity

Over the years, especially when you're talking about 100 years, many things can go out of fashion but in Purdue Women's Club service to others has never gone out of fashion.

Until the establishment of the club-wide group PWC Volunteers! in 2017, public service was carried out, for the most part, by the various individual interest groups.

The earliest evidence of "service" in our archives happened in the 1930s when members were encouraged to sign up to serve as hostesses at PWC events. The entire reason for the group was to be of service at club events.

Back in 1941 members of Home Economics interest group made articles of clothing for the Red Cross. The PWC treasury supplied seed money, around \$40 that particular year to help purchase materials. Needlecraft groups in 1942-43 spent one day a month on Red Cross Sewing, completing two quilts and a whopping 663 garments.

During World War II, Child Study Groups conducted a highly anticipated clothing exchange each year until the end of the war. In 1946 they also organized a clothing collection for America's allies.

Skip to 1984-85 for another great example. That year PWC president Virginia Jacko made service part of her theme for the year using this motto: Celebrating Sixty-three Years of Service to the Community.

Various projects have been tackled in recent years. In 2014 the 20/30 Something Interest Group organized meals for overnight residents at Lafayette Transitional Housing. Lisa Hoverman challenged the group to make and serve a meal a month.

Eileen Fitzpatrick remembers the Genealogy Interest Group going to cemeteries in search of specific graves to assist the Tippecanoe County Historical Association and the statewide "Find A Grave" project. After the death of PWC president Karen Michler, members of Garden Gals pitched in to keep her yard and garden beds looking the way she would have wanted them to throughout the fall. Another club president, Patti Jischke organized members to read to children at the Purdue Day Care.

Since 2017, when Kathy Matter proposed forming a permanent service group, PWC members have been involved in a truly wide number of activities from "de" decorating the Haan Mansion Museum after the holidays to baking cupcakes to reward runners participating in the annual Cupcake Run/Walk that benefits the Public Schools Foundation of Tippecanoe County. They've helped decorate for Columbian Park's "Boo at the Zoo," assisted the Lions club with vision screenings in local schools and filled many a shift at Food Finders Food Bank.

Two years ago, Anne Marie Markun took over leadership of this active group. If you would like to get on the list to find out about volunteer opportunities, contact her at annemariemarkun5@gmail.com. 

Lois Maickel came to Purdue in 1977 and the following Spring, as I remember, we met at Sue Scholers' to get organized. We played our rounds on the "north" course. We were next to some Purdue farms as we would see cows a bit to the west of the fairway. The starter house where we paid our fee and played was that winged structure

As I remember our group was much larger than now. We must of had 25 to 30 members.

Season number 74 began in May! How's that for a long lasting Interest Group? Congratulations to the Golf Group and may you all have many more great seasons.





Garden Club...Afternoon Group. Evening Group, and then Garden Gals – : St 71 Years of Growth!

Still around after evolving Interest Group

The very earliest section of the garden club that we found in the PWC archives was in 1935-1936. It was listed under the umbrella of the home economics study group. Mrs. J. C. Allen was the chairman and there were 22 members. Average attendance was 19. Programs were presented by members as well as outside speakers like professors J.J. Davis and E.J. Kohl. Garden group dues were 35 cents per year.

By 1950 the garden club was no longer a section of the home economics group. Reading between the lines, we can assume this was an important change for the interest group to be recognized on its own as a group. There was an afternoon section and an evening section.

Topics for the early garden meetings were what could be expected in a garden group today. Topics for the year in the afternoon group included the following: Plot the Home Grounds, Grade and Build Your Lawn with Dr. William Daniel; Soils, Foundation Plantings, Selecting Background Shrubs and Trees, Dry Walls, Pools and Fences, Perennial Planning for Color Effects and the final month of May was left for "Garden Visiting".

The evening group topics were: Visiting a Chrysanthemum Exhibit, Making Flower Arrangements, Planting the Spring Garden, Orchids, Landscaping the New Home, Perennials for Continuous Bloom, English Gardens, Tour of Miss McMullans Gardens, and Garden Pests.

Over the years the garden clubs also visited the Purdue greenhouses, learned about house plants, visited private gardens, learned about the care of perennials, vines, shrubs, bulbs, and trees. In the 50's the groups had around 20 members regularly attending. The focus of the groups also expanded. During the Fall of 1952 the evening and afternoon groups joined forces and assisted in creating the floral decorations for 70 tables at the PWC fall luncheon.

The afternoon and evening sections were both active for many years. The afternoon garden club was active for 44 years (1934-1977). The evening garden club was active for 56 years (1949-2004). These are some of PWC's longest active groups. It is no wonder since flowers have long been an important creative outlet for women.

There were three years where no official garden club was registered at all with PWC. However, the Garden Gals came into existence in 2007 and is current to this day. It is one of the largest PWC clubs in terms of number of members with over 100 members on its email list. Each meeting roughly 20% of the total members attend, but numbers fluctuate from meeting to meeting.

Suzanne Collins was chair until last Spring, and the biggest change that Suzanne made in 2014 was that she decided that a garden club should meet all summer long, when it is best to view gardens.

Jennifer Maguire and Marcy Miller are currently co-chairs of the group. Garden Gals meets March through November.



Garden Gals continued...

Most of the topics of the Garden Gals meetings are similar to what earlier garden groups had. They have included flower and container arranging, tips and care for house plants including African violets, orchids, succulents, and carnivorous plants. Road trips have included visits to an iris breeder's garden, a massive daylily garden, an award winning dahlia garden, two rain gardens, an orchard, the Master Gardeners' Display Gardens as well as many member's gardens. Natural beauty has also been appreciated on hikes through Clegg Gardens, Prophetstown State Park, and the Celery Bog. Speakers such as a landscape contractor, a Purdue Extension Specialist, a photographer, and an arborist have presented specialized information on garden related topics to make the experience more enjoyable and informed. Some meetings have included hands-on projects such as making holiday centerpieces, a succulent dish garden, a fairy garden, a hypertufa bowl for outside planting, and concrete stepping stone.

Flowers brighten up any room, decorate any table and are brought to all our luncheons. We cherish them and we learn about them so we can care for them. With over 100 members, this will be an Interest Group that will carry on for many more years.










Could They Make a Comeback Interest Groups?





Interest Groups That Came ... and Went!






It has often been said that the Interest Groups of the Purdue Women's Club are really the heart and soul of the group. Of that, there can be no doubt.


