Span Plan Contributions

Data from the most recent Span Plan Annual Report (2021-2022) show that 850 Span Plan Students enrolled in the fall and spring semesters. These nontraditional students are both full-time and part-time—receiving guidance, personal and career counseling, tutoring, and/or financial assistance. A total of \$3,100 of scholarship support was awarded among three participating students. A total of \$90,407 was awarded in academic scholarship support to a total of 61 unique students. And, for the summer session, a total of \$8,079 in academic scholarship support was awarded to 17 unique students.



2021-2022 Span Plan Nontraditional Students

The Purdue Women's Club does its part to boost scholarship funds and assist students. For the 2021-2022 PWC calendar year, members generously contributed \$5,606. And, we have a good start to fulfilling our philanthropic efforts for this year with contributions received from April through June 2023 of \$1,025. The Span Plan Team wishes to thank you for supporting Span Plan.

And looking to the future, a couple of fundraising events will be announced in the coming months that should be fun and involve the talents and expertise of many PWC members.

Educational Excursions Bus Trip to Kokomo, IN Tuesday, September 19, 2023



Our fall tour includes three unique locations in Kokomo. We will start with a tour of Kokomo Opalescent Glass, the oldest producer of art glass in America. After lunch at Martino's Italian Villa, we'll visit the Seiberling Mansion, which houses the Howard County Museum. The mansion which was built in 1891 and has beautiful hand carved woodwork, stained glass windows, and multiple exhibits of Howard County history. The last stop will be at the Elwood Haynes Museum. Mr. Haynes was a gifted inventor who invented a thermostat, a gasoline powered horseless carriage and alloys which are used in jet engines and surgical tools. Registration will start on August 1st and the form will be available to download and print from the PWC website. The cost per member is \$65 and \$70 per nonmember. The Haynes Museum accepts free will donations, but the bus cost, lunch, entrance fees and gratuities are included in the registration fee. The deadline for registration is September 14th.

Big Ten Women's Club Conference June 9-11 Hosted by Michigan State University

The BTWC conference was held at the Michigan State University (MSU) Kellogg Hotel and Conference Center on June 9-11, 2023. The conference center was located on the beautiful banks of the Red Cedar River that runs through the heart of the MSU campus. The conference was a very informative gathering. Activities included a Friday evening welcome reception and networking event offering us the opportunity to talk with 30+ women from the other participating universities and compare our club information.

On Saturday morning, we had the pleasure of listening to the keynote speaker, Dr. Mona Hannah-Attisha, a pediatrician, professor, and public health advocate whose research exposed the Flint water crisis and its effect on the health of Flint children. Dr. Hannah-Attisha's findings and research have been published in various journals including the American Journal of Public Health, and she has received funding from the CDC and the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services for a registry to provide long-term surveillance of and support for Flint water crisis victims. Dr. Mona earned degrees from both Michigan State University and the University of Michigan.

After the morning speaker event, we traveled by bus to Cowles House, the on-campus home of MSU's President and one of the oldest buildings on campus. After lunch, we boarded an MSU University bus for a campus tour. The campus tour was a fun event and a very interesting offering allowing the MSU hosts a chance to showcase their campus, the buildings and programs that are unique to MSU.

A wonderful Saturday evening dinner was provided and followed by roundtable discussions which provided many excellent ideas. A summary of the round table discussion was distributed to all participants and is available to anyone who is interested. Discussions covered areas of: Interest Groups, Finance, Membership and Leadership.

The conference ended on Sunday with a nice breakfast followed by a business meeting to amend the Big Ten Women's Club bylaws (available to anyone interested) and a presentation by Iowa State delegates regarding the 2025 Big Ten Women's Club Conference.

Life before West Lafayette

Mary Ann was born in New Orleans, and felt it was a great place to grow up in. She loves the wonderful food and restaurants, the beautiful oaks with draping moss. She attended an all-girl Catholic high school, Mt Carmel Academy, then on to Newcomb College (at the time, the women's college shared courses and campus with Tulane). At college she became friends with her soon-to-be husband, Richard, where they were both Math majors.

Despite Newcomb College's world-renowned pottery program, Mary Ann did not take a single pottery course there. "I have not an artistic bone in my body! Even my electives were math courses." At Tulane she took a *Fortran & Numerical Analysis* (computer programming) course. This led Mary Ann to work as a computer programmer for Shell Oil Company for three summers and part-time during her senior year. She did mathematical calculations and wrote a computer program to determine when the outer drilling pipe needed to be replaced before it developed holes, preventing spills in the Gulf of Mexico. She also created a program to determine when it was no longer cost-effective to continue pumping oil from a well

Meeting Richard, her husband

Richard and his best friend, Bruce, won the state science fair as HS seniors. Mary Ann's high school math club invited them to come for a talk. The two handsome boys were a hit with the all-girls club. Richard wrote unintelligible math on the board and Mary Ann walked out – she had to take two buses to get home and did not want to waste time. The next year at a Tulane freshman dance, she met Bruce again who gave her a ride home all the way across town. Bruce was not allowed to date Catholics, but he introduced Richard to Mary Ann. Junior year, they happened to have the same Linear Algebra textbook at the library and bonded over how they hated the topic. (Ironically, Richard later wrote a Linear Algebra textbook - now in its 5th edition). They became "library friends", studied together, chatted a lot, and were told to hush by several librarians. Fortunately, they found a more lenient librarian in the Math library which became their spot. Richard was in a square-dancing club and would give her a ride to the dances. Their first official date was an avant-garde theater production where actors stuffed bread into their mouths. Afterwards they got coffee and beignets, far better than the theater bread.

For graduate school, Richard went to MIT and Mary Ann went to Univ. of Maryland. "I was the only girl in two of my classes in graduate school. The statistics professor just called me Lady, and never called me by name. I would show up at his office for the oral exams and he would say, 'Oh, Lady, come in.' "

They got married and MaryAnn moved to the Boston area. Graduate school was not a great fit for her, so she became a computer programmer at Harvard School of Public Health. Her project was to predict where air pollution would travel from smokestacks based on wind conditions, and backtrack from a pollution site to determine its source. This was the beginning era of both computer modeling and environmental studies.

Moving to West Lafayette

In 1971 Richard graduated from MIT and got a job at Purdue as an Asst Prof of Mathematics. Mary Ann immediately joined PWC! Mary Ann was six months pregnant when they arrived. Their son, Bobby, was born in November 1971 and Mark followed in October 1974.

When her boys went to college, Mary Ann worked as an academic advisor for Purdue's Math & Science Counseling departments (13 years: 1990-2003). Mary Ann began as a substitute for an computer science advisor. There were lots of crying students, as CS is a hard major and one prof in particular was a terror. When a permanent position opened up in the Math department, she transferred over. "Much less crying, those students were a happy lot." She really enjoyed helping students and liked talking with them. "I loved meeting all the nice Indiana farm girls, getting to know the international students. I was invited to three student weddings!"

Finding community in West Lafayette

Mary Ann made friends two ways: with young math department friends – who lived in the same apartment complex– and by joining PWC. Mary Ann especially enjoyed PWC's newcomers bridge in the afternoons, while Richard would watch their new baby. Mary Ann continued in this PWC bridge group through 1997. By then she was in four bridge groups – and is still playing, which is over 52 years of bridge!

Mary Ann has been in Tri-Kappa since 1984. She enjoys the social component - made a lot of friends through Tri-Kappa and enjoyed the philanthropic mission of supporting scholarships and local charitable organizations. She and Richard have been active at Blessed Sacrament Church in many ways over the years as well.

While advising, Mary Ann still found time for PWC events; she especially liked going to the luncheons at the Purdue Union. Once retired, she was able to do much more! Mary Ann has gone on <u>many</u> bus trips, was in the young child study group, three couples gourmet groups, Indiana excursions group ("That was so much fun, wish they would start that back up again!"), finance group, antiques group, and the genealogy group (she researched both her and Richard's family trees).

Highlighting Honorary Lifetime PWC Member Mary Ann Penney PWC member since 1971

"PWC has really made life here wonderful." Mary Ann really liked the gourmet groups from which they still have couples-friends, years later. "I've been a long-time member of the International Friendship Group. I gave five talks for them on my travels in India, Turkey, Morocco, and China. I love to listen to other people's talks and see pictures of other countries, too." Currently Mary Ann is in two Euchre groups and Gr8 Gals @ Technology.

Mary Ann's motto: Travel while you can still walk "I've been all over Europe during 26 trips there, many because of Richard's work with other mathematicians and going to conferences. I either went with him or met him after his conferences to travel other places. We spent 7 weeks in China because he was invited to teach for a month in Beijing, and we had a private tour all over China. We also went to Japan, Australia, New Zealand, and had a private tour of India after his conference there.

We did a Viking river cruise in Russia from St. Petersburg to Moscow. Also, we went on three Caribbean cruises and saw quite a few countries and islands of there. Seeing Russia now would be impossible." They have traveled together over most of the USA and Canada. Mary Ann says, "My passion during my life has been TRAVEL!!!!"

PURDUE WOMEN'S CLUB BOWLING LEAGUE



Into Nature




