

## Locard's Exchange Principle

### "Every Contact Leaves a Trace"

The value of trace (or contact) forensic evidence was first recognized by Edmund Locard in 1910. He was the director of the very first crime laboratory in existence, located in Lyon, France.



The Locard's Exchange Principle states that "with contact between two items, there will be an exchange." For example, burglars will leave traces of their presence behind and will also take traces with them. They may leave hairs from their body or fibers from their clothing behind and they may take carpet fibers away with them.

## Forensic Mindset

- Digital Forensic Mindset – Condensed Definition:
  - Using your skills to determine what has occurred or,
  - What most likely occurred as opposed to what is possible
  - You do NOT work for anyone but the TRUTH!
- The tools used are not nearly as important as the person using them!

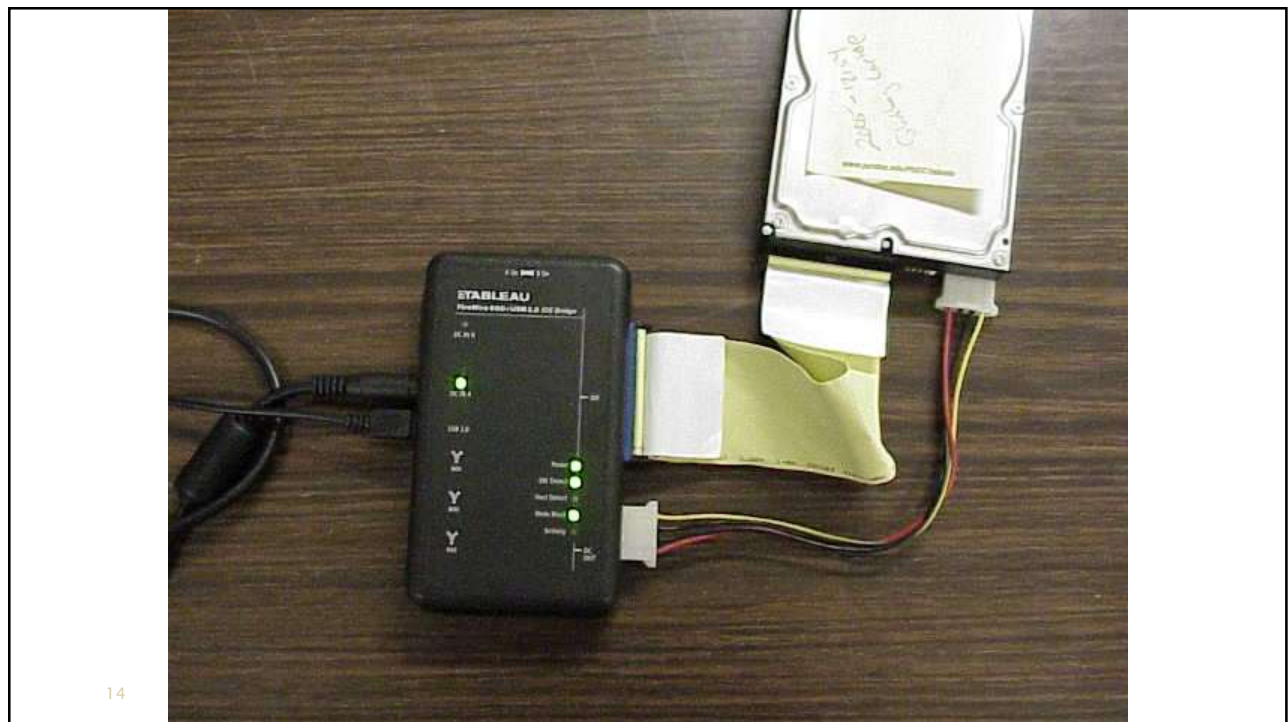

### Two sisters found dead at Purdue Village apartments

Police are investigating a double homicide after the bodies of two sisters were found early Friday in a Purdue University apartment complex.

The victims, both South Korean nationals, were discovered about 10:20 a.m. in an apartment on Arnold Drive in Purdue Village, Joe Bennett, vice president for university relations, said.

The names and ages of

Purdus. Officials would disclose few other details about the killings, the first on the West Lafayette campus since 1998.

Investigators think the two were killed sometime Thursday night and died as a result of "traumatic injuries," Tippecanoe County coroner Martin Avolt said.

The autopsies are scheduled for today at the Indiana Medical Center in Indianapolis.

The gruesome discovery came as a shock to residents

in Purdue Village, a housing complex occupied mostly by international and married students.

"Even a bike wouldn't get stuck here," said Aigun Lu, who returned home for lunch in time to see the bodies being removed from the apartment below his. "I had no idea about this — I'm ... so surprised."

Another Purdue student discovered the bodies and

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**Purdue slayings keep neighbors on alert**

Police reveal identities of Korean sisters

Other than identifying the victims, Purdue University officials would release no new information Saturday in the Thursday night double homicide of two sisters in a campus housing complex.

Found dead from apparent traumatic injuries Friday morning were Yeun Kyung Woo, 31, a doctoral student in biological sciences, and her sister, Han Kwang Woo, 29, of Chicago. Both were Korean nationals whose husbands were in Korea at the time of the crime, said Joe Krometz, Purdue vice president for university relations.

The lack of information released kept neighbors on edge. How were the women killed? What type of weapon was used? Is there any evidence suggesting the killings were domestic in nature, or were they random?

"I don't think I feel totally safe, truthful," said Darya Sherris, a St. Elizabeth Medical Center emergency nurse who lives with her husband, Chris, on the second floor of the building. "No one at the university has called us to let us know anything."

"Classically, we're finding everything out from the news," said her husband, a

**Warrant issued in double homicide**  
Purdue graduate student sought in sisters' deaths

A Purdue University graduate student in biology is being sought in connection with last week's slaying of two women in Purdue Village apartments.

Zhan Yin, 27, a Chinese national, may have fled to the Chicago area, according to officials at Oklahoma State University, where he was last seen.

Yin is wanted in connection with the killings of Yun-ukyang Woo, 31, a Purdue University doctoral student in biology, and her sister, Han Kwang Woo, 29, of Chicago. They were found dead from "traumatic injuries" in Yun-ukyang Woo's apartment Friday morning.

Yin, listed as a doctoral advisee in the most recent Purdue University directory, also lived in Purdue Village.

Aurora, Ill.-based investigators suspect Yin traveled with his wife, Jiao Ke, from Indiana to Stillwater, arriving late Saturday.

Oklahoma State officials said Monday Ke and the unnamed friend at OSU went to police there after Yin disappeared Monday morning.

He was last seen about 7:30 a.m. in Stillwater, driving a red Ford Taurus rental car with Indiana license plate number 95N1297.

Ke reportedly told police she tried to convince her husband to stay in Indiana and cooperate with investigators in the Purdue killings.

Ke stated at Oklahoma State.

Purdue Police Chief Linda Stump reported about 10:30 p.m. Monday that a Tippleshire County warrant charging two counts of murder had been issued against Yin. She would not answer questions.

# Victim's husband rejects 'rage' theory

The husband of a South Korean Purdue University doctoral student found slain in her Purdue Village apartment Aug. 3 said Wednesday that he doesn't think the accused killer was motivated solely by road rage as he has repeatedly told police.

Defendant Zhan Yin has told investigators that he beat and stabbed to death Hye Kyung Woo, 29, because he was angry that she had nearly run him over on his bicycle while driving home, according to court documents.

Yin reportedly told police that he was surprised to realize that he had entered the apartment of Woo's sister, Yeonkyung Woo, 31, a biology research assistant in the Purdue Biological Sciences department.

Yin said he then killed Yeonkyung when she came home as he was cleaning up the blood in the apartment, according to court documents. When she asked him why, he told her he had "no choice."

But Hyuk Jong Lee, Yeonkyung's husband, said he thinks Yin must have known the apartment was his wife's home because Yin had knocked on her door a few weeks before the crime.

When she answered that first time, Yin acted surprised to see Yeonkyung and said he needed to return a friend's hammer, but had

mistaken her apartment for that of the friend, Lee said.

"I strongly believe he is trying to disguise it as an accident to avoid a death sentence," Lee said in an e-mail to the Journal and Courier, his first public comments since the slayings.

"I believe he planned it for quite a long time. How many people are bringing a hammer in their apartment or not. She said they were both kind of surprised."

In an interview Wednesday, Yeonkyung's close friend, biological sciences doctoral student Ho Suk Lee, confirmed that she had told him about the previous encounter with Yin at her apartment.

He recalled Yeonkyung saying that she and Yin laughed about the apparent mix-up, and that Yin had a tool but not necessarily a hammer.

"She said it was some kind of tool," Ho Suk Lee said. "I don't know whether he entered the apartment or not. She said they were both kind of surprised."

In a probable cause affidavit released last week by police after Yin's arrest in upstate New York, Yin told police during questioning on Aug. 3 that he had been in Woo's apartment "one time, about a month or two earlier."

Isaiah Peters, another doctoral student working in the same lab as Yin, Ho Suk Lee and

### **Pondering the death penalty**

Tippecanoe County prosecutor Jerry Bean said Wednesday that trial rules precluded him from publicly commenting on the plausibility of Yin's "road rage" claim. Because he has yet to receive all police and lab reports from the investigation, Bean said it was still too early to know whether he will seek the death penalty or life imprisonment without parole.

Bean has no deadline to make the decision under state law, but he expects to do so in a matter of weeks, he said.

Yin's claim of road rage would have no bearing on whether he is convicted of the Woo murders. However, if Bean seeks the death penalty or life imprisonment without parole, Yin's defense counsel could cite the road rage as a mitigating factor in the penalty phase of the trial.

# Remains likely those of missing student

Police suspect that human remains found in the trunk of a car in Rosemont, Ill., belong to a Purdue University graduate student who has been missing since last week.

The Cook County medical examiner is investigating to determine whether the dismembered body belongs to Lei He, 28, a graduate student in Purdue's mechanical engineering school.

Meanwhile, authorities in Shanghai, China, have detained He's wife, Danglei Chen, 28, who recently attempted to enter her native China using her husband's passport.

U.S. authorities plan to request extradition, according to Lafayette police.

He's major professor was checked and confirmed by the news Wednesday.

"Lei was a very intelligent and inquisitive student who brought an exceptional degree of creativity to his research," J. Stuart Bolton, professor of mechanical engineering, told the Journal and Courier by e-mail.

"He was a very positive individual and a pleasure to work with. I will miss our conversations greatly. His death is tragic at both a personal and professional level — I was sure that he had a very bright future in acoustics research."

Chen came to Purdue in January 2001 as a graduate student in chemical engineering. She married He in May 2001, and He enrolled as a graduate student in spring 2002.

Chen, according to a comment by her attorney in court last week, was "kicked out" of Purdue in January 2005, after she was accused of stabbing her husband.

Lt. John Withers of the Lafayette Police Department said Wednesday there is evidence suggesting He may have been killed in the apartment he shared with his wife at 705 J.N. Fifth St., one block from the Tippecanoe County Morgan.



It's the third time police have investigated allegations of a violent confrontation between Chen and her husband.

**Violent history**

Chen was scheduled to enter a plea agreement last Friday in Tippecanoe Superior Court 2, where she was charged with attempted murder, accused of stabbing He in an apartment they shared in Purdue Village.

According to previous court testimony, Chen also had been arrested by Purdue police on April 12, 2003, on suspicion of domestic violence.

# Chinese review homicide evidence

Chen likely to be prosecuted pending exam

A former Lafayette woman accused of murdering her husband in Lafayette and then attempting to enter China using his passport likely will be prosecuted in China.

A delegation of Chinese officials spent time with Lafayette Police Department detectives Wednesday, reviewing police reports and viewing photographs and videos related to the killing of Lei He, 28, a mechanical engineering graduate student at Purdue University

Beijing, said through an interpreter.

"If we do not find any psychological problems, we will prosecute in compliance with Chinese criminal law — definitely."

Depending on the circumstances of the crime, the penalty for homicide in China can range from as little as three years in prison to execution.

"In China, it is not our purpose to inflict punishment against a suspect, but to educate the suspect

# Ex-Purdue student sentenced to death

**BELJING** — A former Purdue University graduate student has been sentenced to death for murdering her husband in Indiana and hiding his dismembered body in the trunk of a car, state media said Wednesday.

Shanghai's No. 1 Intermediate court sentenced Danlei Chen, 29, to death with a two-year reprieve on Monday, the *People's Daily* newspaper said. Such sentences are routinely commuted to life in prison if the inmate is cooperative.

Chen, 29, was also ordered to pay her husband Lei He's parents \$55,000 in compensation, the paper said. Chen's lawyer, Zhang Peihong, told the *Shanghai Daily* newspaper his client had no plans to appeal the verdict.

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# Purdue coach, player suspended

**Inquiry focusing on possible violations in 'academic realm'**

Purdue University indefinitely suspended women's basketball assistant coach Katrina Merriweather and junior guard Cherele George on Thursday after a preliminary inquiry into possible violations of university and NCAA regulations. The alleged violations, which were brought to the attention of the university by a member of the athletic department staff in the

past month, "touch on the academic realm," associate athletic director Jay Cooperider said.

The potential violations are more than one and fewer than five, Cooperider said.

Purdue's internal inquiry is not centered on recruiting or the recruitment of the 5-foot-3 George, who came from Iowa Western Community College last spring. Cooperider said the allegations stem from George's tenure at Purdue.



**Merriweather George**

Merriweather is suspended with pay, and George is still enrolled in school. But Cooperider said neither can participate in any team functions, including practices.

Neither Merriweather nor George accompanied the team to Indianapolis on Thursday for the Big Ten Conference tournament.

The 14th-ranked Boilermakers, the tournament's second seed, will face Illinois in tonight's quarterfinal matchup at Conseco Fieldhouse. The Fighting Illini defeated Northwestern 60-49 in Thursday's first round.

Merriweather, a third-year assistant under head coach Kristy Curry, and George did not return phone calls seeking comment.

Roger Blalock, senior associate athletic director and administrator for women's basketball, said in a university release that no timetable has been set for completion of the inquiry.

"We expect the review to move along quickly, but we will not rush to get it done without asking all the proper questions," Blalock said. "Appropriate campus personnel will be involved in the process, which will be governed by Purdue and NCAA rules."

Cooperider said the timetable will likely be "days to weeks and not months. If the handful of allegations all end up being null and void, then it will be relatively quick."

"The situation is unlikely to be resolved in time for Merriweather and George to participate in this weekend's tournament."
